International Year of the Planet Earth (IYPE)

IYPE was registered as a non-profit organisation in the State of Delaware on 16th March. The statutes are approved and a tax-free status also requires bye-laws, which are now being developed. The management team was an informal body supported by IUGS and UNESCO and will now be replaced by a Board and Secretariat. The management team and representatives from IUGS (Peter Bobrowsky) and UNESCO (Robert Missotten) are acting as a provisional board (11 persons).

National IYPE committees are now established in 23 nations. The IUGS-IYPE lateral agreement states that partners who have taken the initiative for IYPE are acknowledged as founding partners. IYPE has now established a total of 50 partnerships. It is expected that most geological surveys in Europe will ultimately be partners. Three geological surveys in Europe had responded positively – Norway, Ireland, Spain. There are 26 associate partners. Partnership increase the funding, but major sponsorship should come from industry

Plans for the near future include the launching of the full science programme, divided into ten broad themes. Two decisions to be made soon are:

- Establishment of the IYPE secretariat.
- Formation of the IYPE Board

The Outreach Programme Committee has by now developed a website (<http://www.esfs.org/>), produced flyers in twelve languages, and released many thousands of general information brochures and leaflets. IYPE would like national committees to translate these documents into their own languages, where translations

are not already available. New outreach ideas are welcomed. Planning is in progress for a high-level meeting (heads of state and top-level scientists) at UNESCO early in 2008. There is a link to the new UN plan on Sustainable Development.
