REPORT ON THE IGCP-GEOPARK MEETING AND ITS IGGP UMBRELLA, PARIS

The Geopark community, supported by about 50 Member States and representatives of the International Geoscience Program (IGCP) and IUGS, finalized the new statutes for the International Geopark Geoscience Program IGGP at UNESCO Headquarters, Paris, February 24–27. This new structure was proposed by IUGS and UNESCO Member States to gather the Global Geoparks Network (GGN) and the IGCP as two pillars under a joint umbrella, the IGGP.

The GGN remains mostly independent of the IGCP but has asked IUGS for support in reviewing the geoscientific aspects in applications and revisions for UNESCO Global Geoparks (see below the "Call for Experts to Evaluate GGN application"). IUGS welcomes this sign of confidence in assuring high scientific standards.

During the discussion of the IGGP statutes, the IGCP and IUGS community stipulated that the name "International Geoscience Program", its acronym "IGCP" and its logo shall be kept. This was supported by Member States and accepted by the Geopark community and thus is now in the IGGP statutes that will be submitted to the UNESCO Executive Board. Further to the statutes of IGGP, the Geopark guidelines were finalized and accepted by the delegates.

The International Geoscience Program IGCP has an independent structure from Geoparks, retaining a high-standard independent Scientific Council with 6 ordinary members plus the UNESCO Director General as well as IUGS Secretary General as ex-officio members of the board (without right to vote). The Council shall be responsible for evaluating proposals as well as advising the UNESCO Director General and the IUGS President on strategy, planning and implementation of the IGCP. An IGCP Bureau consisting of Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson and Rapporteur of the IGCP Council as well as the UNESCO Director General and the IUGS Secretary General shall make the final decisions on IGCP project proposals and levels of funding, and hold joint coordination meetings with the Bureau of the Global Geoparks Network (GGN).



During the IGCP–IUGS program evaluation meeting, over 40 projects were reviewed, of which 35 were attributed a grant. This year, UNESCO, IUGS, China, and the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (SIDA) were able to support the program. SIDA started an Africa-oriented IGCP action under the auspices of Felix Toteu from the UNESCO Nairobi office. Proposals related to the IGCP–SIDA call were evaluated separately but still by IUGS experts of the IGCP evaluation team. During the brainstorming discussion that followed the evaluation meeting, new thoughts for the bylaws for the IGCP were presented and collected. The UNESCO Secretariat, IUGS and the IGCP board will work jointly with members of the IGCP National Committees.

UNESCO SUPPORTS IUGS' RFG INITIATIVE

UNESCO signalized that the IUGS' initiative on Resourcing Future Generations (RFG) will be supported. Details could not be finalized during the IGGP, Geopark and IGCP meeting.

CALL FOR EXPERTS TO EVALUATE GLOBAL GEOPARK APPLICATIONS

The <u>Global Geoparks Network</u> (GGN), supported by UNESCO, provides a global platform of active cooperation between experts and practitioners in geological heritage. Under the umbrella of UNESCO and through regional network partners, significant national geological sites gain worldwide recognition and visibility through tourism as well as best practices within the scientific and education community. GGN continues to expand each year, currently comprising 111 Global Geoparks in 34 countries. In 2014, 17 new applications were submitted to UNESCO and these are now under evaluation.

IUGS is a partner with UNESCO and the Global Geopark Network and assists in finding geoscientists who are willing to evaluate the geological sections of each new Geopark application for their international significance. IUGS is currently seeking reviewers for the geological sections of each of the seventeen (17) Geopark applications for 2015. These aspiring Geopark applications are: Beaujolais (France); Belogradchik (Bulgaria); Celestienne, Lesse and Lomme (Belgium) (application in French); Dunhuang (PRC China); Golden Geopark of Lapland (Finland); Grevena Tethys (Greece); Imbabura (Ecuador); Izu Peninsula (Japan); Lochaber (Scotland); Mons (Belgium) (application in French); Mount Apoi (Japan); Pollino (Italy); Shouf Jezzine (Lebanon); Sitia (Greece); Toba (Indonesia); Troodos (Cyprus); Zhijindong (PRC China).

Please contact IUGS VP Marko Komac (<u>marko.komac@geo-zs.si</u>) for further analysis if you are an expert (or wish to suggest one) in the field of geoscience relevant to one of the aspiring Geopark applications and are willing to examine the application file and complete a short evaluation form regarding the significance of the geological heritage under consideration.

STRATI2015 CONGRESS, GRAZ (JULY 19-23, 2015)

STRATI2015, the 2nd International Congress on Stratigraphy, which is sponsored by the IUGS International Commission on Stratigraphy (ICS), will be held on July 19–23, 2015 in Graz, Austria. The technical program will range from the Archean to the Holocene, across all techniques and applications of stratigraphy and the discoveries that the stratigraphic record reveals about the Earth system. In addition, it will also serve as the primary venue for ICS business, for ICS sub-commissions to meet, and awarding the ICS stratigraphy prizes. Abstracts should be submitted by April 24. The meeting will be preceded and followed by numerous <u>field trips</u> in Central Europe.
